Lindlyn Moma



She is a human rights lawyer and environmental activist with over 20 years of experience challenging human and environmental rights violations in Africa. She has a rich history of leadership roles within the environmental justice sector. Currently, she serves as the Global Advocacy Director of the Laudato Si Movement, mobilizing people of faith to protect our common home. Lindlyn holds a Bachelor of Law obtained at the Univerity of Buea, a Matric (French

Postgraduate Diploma) en Science Juridique et Politique from Universite Catholique de l'Afrique Centrale and a Master of Law in Human Rights and Democracy in Africa from the University of Pretoria, and is ready for a P.h.D on "A human rights mandate to ensure the right to a clean and healthy environment" at the University of Pretoria Law Faculty.

Jean Quinn



She is a member of the International Congregation of the Daughters of Wisdom. She is a Nurse by Profession who studied Family Therapy, Addiction Studies, and Social Housing Studies with the Irish Council for Social Housing. She also studied Theology and Philosophy at Milltown Institute in Dublin. Since joining the UNANIMA International Team as the Executive Director in 2017, Jean's passion for Justice, Peace, and Integrity of Creation has continuously been utilized in her

international advocacy. Through this role, she is the Co-Chair of the NGO Working Group to End Homelessness and a Member at Large of the NGO Committee of Social Development.

Archbishop Peter Loy Chong



He is a Catholic Archbishop of Suva, Fiji. He holds a doctorate from the Graduate Theological Union in Berkeley, California, United States. Since 2018, he has been the President of the Federation of Catholic Bishops' Conferences of Oceania.









Jean Germain Rajoelison



Father Jean Germain Rajoelison is the Deputy Secretary General Symposium of Episcopal Conferences of Africa and Madagascar (SECAM). He has called for a new Africa invigorated and shaped by the Gospel and a new inculturation of the Good News in the family, schools, universities, politics, and economics. He has also emphasized the need for pastoral strategies to launch a new missionary momentum.

He is a Peruvian Catholic Augustinian priest, auxiliary bishop of Cusco, and General Secretary of the Latin American and Caribbean Catholic Episcopal Council (CELAM) from 2023-2027. He obtained a Doctorate in Education in Peru and a Doctorate in Pastoral Theology in Colombia.

Lorna Gold



She is the Chief Executive of FaithInvest, having previously held the position of Director of Movement Building. She joined FaithInvest in 2020 and has over two decades of experience engaging faiths on environmental, climate, and economic justice. Lorna worked at a senior level in Trocaire, the official overseas development agency of the Catholic Church in Ireland. She is a leading voice on faith-consistent investing in the Catholic Church and supported the Irish Bishops' Conference to divest from fossil fuels in 2018. She is

Chair of the Laudato Si' Movement (formerly the Global Catholic Climate Movement) and a member of the Vatican's Covid Commission Economics Taskforce.

Tzeporah Berman



She is currently the International Program Director at Stand.earth and the Chair of the Fossil Fuel Non-Proliferation Treaty Initiative. She is the former co-director of Greenpeace International's Climate and Energy Program and co-founder of ForestEthics. In 2016, Tzeporah was appointed by the Alberta Government to co-chair the Oil Sands Advisory Working Group, tasked with making









recommendations to implement climate change and cumulative impact policies, and was listed as one of the 35 most influential women in British Columbia by BC Business Magazine. In 2015, she was awarded the YWCA Women of Distinction Award in British Columbia, and in 2013, was awarded an honorary doctorate from the University of British Columbia.

He is the International Programme Coordinator at IYCS-JECI. He holds a Master's degree in Development Economics and International Development from the Université Gustave Eiffel and an International Economics Master's degree from the Université Paris-Est Créteil (UPEC).
